All nominations should be in the hands of the secretary prior to the AGM which will take place at 8 p. m. Wednesday 19th March. To date only two nomination forms have been delivered. All members should consider what they can do to help with the administration of the club - ALL positions become vacant at the AGM.

Past Activities

February 19th Social Night annual talk by Noel Kennon was very well attended by members. This year the talk was on diamonds. Noel spoke about the origin of the stones deep in the earth at high pressure and heat. The locations where diamonds are found are also areas where the continental plates meet. They are brought to the surface in volcanic eruptions but as the carbon (graphite) is combustible at too high a heat the conditions have to be just right for diamonds to survive in the two types of host rock. Noel explained that the hardness of diamonds at 10 on the Mohs scale is due to the very tight bond of the molecules. An entirely different bond exist in the molecules in graphite which has a hardness of only 1 to 2 on the Mohs scale yet diamonds and graphite are the same chemically. To finish off the talk Noel showed photographs of some of the largest and most expensive diamonds ever found along with stories of their history. To the regret of many members, no freebies this time but Noel did have a model of one of the large diamonds to be viewed.

Mineral Group

Fourteen members attended the first meeting of the year and Aaron, Geoff and Noel gave reports of recent purchases and visits. The identification exercise was conducted by Ann and the four minerals identified were; kyanite, calcite, hematite and quartz. Remember only FOUR specimens each month for ID. There is a working bee on Monday 10th February, 8.30am to sort rocks in the shed. John presented an item of interest about the possibility that Antarctica may not only have ice but diamonds as well. Diamonds could be found in rocks known as kimberlites. However, mining in Antarctica is banned for 50 yrs. from 1991. Geoff Irwin presented apatite as the mineral of the month. According to Fleischer there is no such mineral as apatite but there are three separate minerals; chlorapatite Ca5(PO4)3CL, fluorapatite Ca5(PO4)3F and hydroxylapatite Ca(PO4)3OH. The apatites are members of the apatite group which includes pyromorphite (phosphate), mimetite (arsenate) and vanadinite (vanadinate). Noel introduced the families of minerals 1 as the topic of the month. Noel spoke about the various groups of minerals which Fleischer lists at the rear of the book. There are a great number. The three we will be concentrating on are the zeolites, garnets and micas. Noel also outlined the basic points necessary to prepare a power point presentation. Freebies of scolecite from Arkaroola supplied by Ann and Noel.
