Mineral Group

Seventeen members present and reports given by Geoff about diopside from Mt. Elliot and Keith about recent finds from Tambar Springs, calcite and quartz. The identification exercise was presented by Eva. Well, some specimens had over six minerals present and the ten specimens were; 1. calcite, quartz, pyrite, garnet and galena, 2. quartz, dravite, peridot and apatite, 3. quartz 4. gypsum 5. quartz 6. quartz 7. rhyolite, mainly quartz 8. quartz 9. pyrite, sphalerite, realgar, orpiment, galena and quartz 10. galena, rhodonite and sphalerite. Eva will be banned from giving ID tests! Margaret presented gold as the mineral of the month. Gold (Au native element) is a pleasure to own and possess, as many people have discovered throughout the ages and around the world. Gold is a very stubborn element when it comes to reacting to or combining with other elements. Keeping this in mind helps to explain many things about gold. There are very few true gold ores, besides native gold, because it forms a major part of only a few rare minerals, it is found as little more than a trace in a few others or it is alloyed to a small extent with other metals such as silver. Gold is almost indestructible and has been used and then reused for centuries to the extent that all gold of known existence is almost equal to all the gold that has ever been mined. Gold is a great medium metal for jewellery, as it never tarnishes. Native gold wires emerging from massive white quartz can make for a visually stunning specimen. Good natural specimens are more expensive than their actual weight value. This is to be expected as good gold crystals are somewhat scarce (most are dissolved, crushed, or melted down as part of the mining process) and the only justification for preserving a specimen is the expectation that it will bring a higher price in its natural state. Noel discussed mineral properties as the topic of the month. Minerals can not always be identified by composition or crystal structure. Other properties are useful such as hardness, density, cleavage, fracture or streak. Hardness and density together give a good indication what the mineral may be.
