Chainmaille is a no solder method of jewellery making which has been around for centuries. You will learn the use of the jumpring maker and how to put those little links together to make a beautiful bracelet. Bracelet kits will be available <u>from</u> \$30 each (or you can bring your own wire, you will need at least 3.5metres of 1mm soft sterling silver wire). Your tutors will be Maureen Young, Barry Young and Lynne Webb.

You will need to bring with you

- * A teatowel or mat to work on
- * 2 x Chain Nose (or flat) pliers
- * Glasses or magnifying Visor if you vision is not so good
