

ILC Mineral Group

The next Mineral class will be on Wednesday 23rd June, 2021, starting at 5.45pm with finger food before the DVD (everyone to bring a savoury or sweet plate), the main meeting will start at 6.30pm in the clubrooms at 51 Meadow St, Tarrawanna.

Last month's class was held on the 26th of May and was well attended.

Members brought one mineral specimen from their collection and had 5 minutes to talk about it. The following is Noel's account of the evening; Ann led off with her ruby crystal from India, then Ed with his iridium from Tasmania, and David told us how he hand-polished two flats on a hump of jasper. Next was Don and his large pieces of corundum, and Coral with her large piece of quartz, then Peter and his Madagascan celestine geode. We finished up with Pam and her sapphire pendant made by David, Roly and the spectacular polished graphic granite and finally Vicki and her yellow quartz – oops, sorry, calcite. All very interesting pieces and very well presented. Thank you all.

It was decided that we will have a full day working bee on a weekend day in July to clean up the mineral show cases at the front of the hall. The date will be decided at the next meeting.

We finished the meeting with Exercise No 16 – gem minerals. This exercise was quite difficult as all specimens were in the as-found condition. To be ID'd were specimens of topaz, diamond, sapphire, ruby, aquamarine, zircon and two each of emerald and elbaite. Of the four major gemstones, ruby, sapphire and emerald were there but the fourth was missing. Now, which one was that? The best ID was 9/10 and the average was about 5/10 which was a good result.

We finished up with freebies (elbaite, rutile and malachite), and supper. It was a really good night made better by a total eclipse of the full moon which we ducked outside to follow over a couple of hours. - Noel

It was a lovely day and a great opportunity for club members to do some fossicking without getting their hands dirty."


Members Works & Achievements

It is with sadness that I inform our Membership of the passing of our esteemed long-time member, Joan Sheppard.

Joan was one of our longest serving members, having joined the Club in 1968 and became a Life Member in 1991. Joan served the Club in various positions including President and Secretary in the 1980's but will perhaps be best remembered for her love of fun, travel and, of course, lapidary pursuits.

Joan was famous for her Gemtree masterpieces and was there right at the start of these creations. Once she became proficient at a lapidary craft, such as, Gemtrees or the carving of Emu Eggs, she was happy to pass on her knowledge through running classes. Joan was a great organiser and loved to travel. She organised at least 20 extended bus trips for members and others that usually took in the National Gemboree Show together with site seeing, tourist activities and sometimes fossicking. Trips included Launceston Tasmania, Rockingham WA, Alice Springs NT, and Toowoomba Qld. Joan even made it to the famous Tucson, Arizona megashow in 1989.

Joan was always a very keen participant in the Club's fossicking trips. She was also very involved in the Club's Christmas Skits which were a feature of our Christmas get togethers for many years. The sparkle in Joan's eyes (with perhaps a touch of mischievousness), her infectious laughter, and adventurous spirit is what I most remember.

Rest in Peace Joan, you touched the lives of many for the better.
